




Section 1: Search: search results



Search Results: two types




Detail shown with thumbnails



Section 1: Search results - a record with an image (showing the top of screen)




The image viewer: shows the full image (lower part of screen)






Browse and Search within Bodleian Library records in the VRTI.





Section 3: Useful starting points



Portals: many record collections brought together for researching:

- Population and Family History
- Age of Revolution (1798 rebellion, US Revolution)
- Age of Conquest: medieval Ireland

Gold Seams: Ten particularly rich collections for researching more specific topics.

Curated Collections: Different series of records united by a common theme e.g. maps, or the *Dublin Gazette* (1750-1800).

Tip: You can search within any Portal, Gold Seam or Curated Collection to find records *only from that particular part* of the Virtual Treasury.





The Population Portal

A single location for any records in the Virtual Treasury which are useful for family history. The major collections here include:

- Gleanings and Fragments from the Censuses of Ireland, 1813–1891
- Census Reports, 1821-1891 (the statistics)
- The <u>1766 Religious Census</u>

Many other individual records containing lists of names are also available in the Population Portal.
